Developing Explain if the preposition used in a sentence makes sense. Includes the prepositions: of, to, in, for, with, on, by, at, from, but, into, like, over, before, up, out, because of, due to.

Expected Explain if the preposition used in a sentence makes sense. Includes the prepositions from Developing and the prepositions: between, after, since, around, without, among, against, including, following, across, behind, beyond, about, near, above, down, off, through, as a result of.

Greater Depth Explain if the preposition used in a sentence makes sense. Includes the prepositions from Developing and Expected and the prepositions: despite, throughout, towards, upon, except, plus, concerning, on account of.

Questions 2, 5 and 8 (Application)

Developing Replace the preposition to change the meaning of a sentence. Includes a word bank. Differentiation the same as question 1.

Expected Replace the preposition to change the meaning of a sentence. Differentiation the same as question 4.

Greater Depth Replace the preposition to change the meaning of a sentence. Differentiation the same as question 7.

Questions 3, 6 and 9 (Application)

Application and Reasoning What is a Preposition?

Developing

- 1a. Yes because 'into' shows where she went in relation to the cave.
- 2a. Charlie and Danny waited by the steps.
- 3a. Various answers, for example: with, by.

Expected

- 4a. No because 'among' is a preposition of place. The sentence needs a preposition of time such as 'after'.
- 5a. Various answers, for example: Holly fell against the stairs and scratched her arms and legs; Holly fell as a result of the stairs and scratched her arms and legs.
- 6a. Various answers, for example: behind, near, by.

Greater Depth

- 7a. No because 'towards' is a preposition of place. The sentence needs a preposition of cause such as 'on account of'.
- 8a. Various answers, for example: The whole class including me went rock climbing and abseiling last week; The whole class plus me went rock climbing and abseiling last week.
- 9a. Various answers, for example: on account of, as a result of, due to.

Application and Reasoning What is a Preposition?

Developing

- 1b. No because 'out' is a preposition of place. The sentence needs a preposition of time such as 'before'.
- 2b. Daisy and Jenny walked over the bridge.
- 3b. Various answers, for example: into, at.

Expected

- 4b. No because 'between' is a preposition of place. The sentence needs a preposition of cause such as 'as a result of'.
- 5b. Various answers, for example: Zara and Alex walked around the village to get back home; Zara and Alex walked near the village to get back home.
- 6b. Various answers, for example: above, through, between.

Greater Depth

- 7b. No because 'on account of' is a preposition of cause. The sentence needs a preposition of time such as 'throughout'.
- 8b. Various answers, for example: Ramaya stepped carefully towards the rocks and walked cautiously; Ramaya stepped carefully near the rocks and walked cautiously.
- 9b. Various answers, for example: towards, to, across.
