Greater Depth Complete a sentence using a time preposition. Includes the time prepositions from Developing and Expected, plus the less commonly used: during, through, throughout and towards.

Questions 2, 5 and 8 (Reasoning)

Developing Explain if time prepositions have been placed correctly in a sentence. Differentiation the same as question 1.

Expected Explain if time prepositions have been used correctly in a sentence. Differentiation the same as question 4.

Greater Depth Explain if time prepositions have been placed correctly in a sentence. Differentiation the same as question 7.

Questions 3, 6 and 9 (Reasoning)

Developing Explain whether a different preposition will change the meaning of a sentence. Differentiation the same as question 1.

Expected Explain whether a different preposition will change the meaning of a sentence. Differentiation the same as question 4.

Greater Depth Explain whether a different preposition will change the meaning of a sentence. Differentiation the same as question 7.

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Application and Reasoning Using Prepositions to Express Time

Developing

1a. Various answers, for example: I'm going to the cinema at the weekend.
2a. <u>from</u> – this should come before '6pm'
3a. No, as 'on' would give them longer to return the money.

Expected

4a. Various answers, for example: I haven't eaten since this morning.
5a. <u>beyond</u> – this should come after 'continued'

6a. No, as 'after' means the snack was eaten at a different time.

Greater Depth

7a. Various answers, for example: I like to wear shorts and T-shirts throughout the summer months.

8a. <u>through</u> – this should come before 'the night'

9a. No, as 'following' means that the cheese will be served after the main meal.

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Developing

1b. Various answers, for example: The weather is warmer in summer.
2b. <u>before</u> – this should come before '8pm'

3b. No, as 'at' means they have to arrive at that specific time.

Expected

4b. Various answers, for example: They were given until Friday to return the jewels.
5b. <u>following</u> – this should come before 'day'

6b. No, as 'beyond' means it will take more than an hour.

Greater Depth

7b. Various answers, for example: Leaves begin to fall from the trees towards the end of September.

8b. <u>during</u> – this should come before 'the war'

9b. No, as 'until' means that Tuesday was the first time the strange looking creature had been seen.
