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

Application and Reasoning Using Prepositions to Express Cause

Developing

1a. It doesn't make sense. 'For' doesn't explain why the children were excited.
2a. I play indoors because of the rain.
3a. Yes, 'of' helps to explain the cause of the excitement.

Expected

4a. No, it doesn't change the meaning of the sentence as both prepositions express cause.

5a. I won the competition through hard work/luck and luck/hard work. Or, Through hard work/luck and luck/hard work I won the competition.

6a. Yes, 'as a result of' helps to explain the cause of the flooding.

Greater Depth

7a. No, it doesn't change the meaning of the sentence as both prepositions express cause.

8a. My dad/teacher wants to talk to my teacher/dad concerning my work.

9a. Yes, the sentence makes sense. The traffic jam was what caused this person to miss their flight.

6b. Yes, 'through' helps to explain the cause of the win.

Greater Depth

7b. Yes, it changes the meaning to the opposite and it doesn't make sense.8b. I don't like pizza on account of the cheese on top.

9b. Yes, it makes sense. The brother's excellent instructions were responsible for this person being able to decorate the cake so beautifully.
