



Application and Reasoning Using Expanded Noun Phrases

Developing

1a. Various possible answers, for example: 'My dirty shoes'

2a. Various possible answers, for example: I buy sweets from the little shop near school.

3a. Incorrect. The noun phrase 'the fire' has been expanded using the word 'warm' which is an adjective not a preposition.

Expected

4a. Various possible answers, for example: 'dark clouds above me'

5a. Various possible answers, for example: I sat on the rickety, old bench opposite the duck pond and feed the ducks at the park.

6a. Incorrect. The noun phrase 'the card from my grandma' contains 'from' which is a preposition, but no adjective.

Greater Depth

7a. Various possible answers, for example: 'The very high hedge at the bottom of the garden'

8a. Various possible answers, for example: There is a very big fairground close to the beach.

9a. Correct. The noun phrase 'The very old carpet in the living room' contains the adverb 'very', the adjective 'old' and the preposition 'in'.

Developing

1b. Various possible answers, for example: 'The broken toys'

2b. Various possible answers, for example: I went to a wedding at the old church by the park.

3b. Correct. The noun phrase 'The old, rickety garden fence' contains the adjectives 'old' and 'rickety'.

Expected

4b. Various possible answers, for example: 'a thick jumper under my coat'

5b. Various possible answers, for example: I'm going to throw away the useless, old knife with the broken handle.

6b. Correct. The noun phrase 'The old clock in the hall' contains the adjective 'old' and the preposition 'in'.

Greater Depth

7b. Various possible answers, for example: 'The extremely tall tree near the house' 8b. Various possible answers, for example: Have you seen the extremely old statue in front of the museum?

9b. Incorrect. The noun phrase 'the loud church bell' contains the adjective 'loud' and the modifying noun 'church' but it does not contain an adverb or a preposition.
