Class News

Class R This week in maths we have continued developing our skills in grouping and sharing. In topic we found out all about octopus and jellyfish. We wrote about what we would do if we were an octopus and also made our own model jellyfish. In PE we have practising for sports day and had lots of fun with the eggs and spoons!

Class 1 This week Class 1 have been looking at historical toys and discussing how they have changed over the years due to the material, technology and many other factors. In maths Y2 have been working hard on their time unit-telling the time to o'clock, half past, quarter past and quarter to. Y1 have just started their place value to 100 unit and have been partitioning numbers into tens and ones. Alongside this, in PE we have been practising for sports day. The children have tried super hard with their egg and spoon race, long jump and races. Y2 have been super busy this week with creating their own Flat Stanley! They brought them home on Thursday alongside a letter for parents. They are all really excited to take Stanley on adventures so we can write our postcard journal. Well done, Class 1.

Class 2 Class 2 have had a great week this week! In English we have been drafting our persuasive leaflets for the lands that we have created. We have looked at how to use persuasive language, rhetorical questions and how to find synonyms to improve our writing. In maths, Year 3 have been investigating acute, rightangled and obtuse angles. Year 4 have been identifying types of triangles, quadrilaterals and polygons. In science we investigated which shoe creates the most friction on the carpet. We then created our own bar charts to present the data that we created. During our forest school session, we observed living creatures in different areas around school. We are now going to work in groups to create something to encourage more wildlife in the areas that we found did not have much. A super week everyone, well done!

Class 3 Class 3 have been busy this week with both year groups spending transition time at Calder High in different departments! Year 6 completed activities in expressive arts while Year 5 headed over to science! We have also started our new topic which is a local history study on the Cragg Vale Coiners! We began by putting different periods of British history in order and then used the history timeline on the KS2 corridor to help us see where the Coiners came! In science, we looked at the relationship between the sun, the moon and the earth and what an eclipse is! We also enjoyed a Zoolab session where we got to hold and learn about land snails, tree frog, stick insects and corn snakes. What a fantastic week, Class 3!

Year 4 and the English Chamber Orchestra!



WHATSAPP

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? With more than two billion active users, WhatsApp is the world's most popular messaging service its end-to-end encryption only allows messages to be viewed by the sender and any recipients; not even WhatsApp itself can read them. The UK's Online Safey Bill proposes to end such encryption on private messaging, but for the time being, this controversial feature remains.

EVOLVING SCAMS

WhatsApp's popularity makes it a lucrative hunting ground for scammers. Recent examples include posing as the target's child, requesting a money transfer because of a spurious 'emergency' plus a scam where fraudsters trigger a verification message by attempting to log in to your account, then (posing as WhatsApp) call or text to ask you to repeat the code back to them, giving them

CONTACT FROM STRANGERS

To start a chat, someone only needs the mobile number of the WhatsApp user that they want to message. Therefore, if a child has ever given their number out to someone they don't know, that person could then contact them via WhatsApp. It's also possible that the child might be added to a group chat or community (by one of their friends, for example) containing other people that they don't know.

CHAT LOCK

In 2023, WhatsApp introduced a feature that lets users keep their chats in a separate locked chats' folder, saved behind their phone's passcode, fingerprint or face in authentication. They subsequently developed an additional feature "Secret Code" – where users set a unique password for their locked chats. Unfortunately, this function creates the potential for young people to hide conversions and content they suspect their parents wouldn't approve of (such as age—inappropriate material).

COMMUNITIES AND GROUPS

A community is a collection of related groups on WhatsApp. They can consist of thousands of users. Communities can often be used by scammers to target large groups, hoping someone clicks on their link or responds to their requests. In communities and groups, there are multiple ongoing conversations, which results in pressure to respond. Members — even if they are not each other's contacts — will be able to see any messages sent into the group.

'VIEW ONCE'

The ability to send images or messages that can only be viewed once has led to some WhatsApp users sharing inappropriate material or abusive texts, knowing that the recipient can't re-open them later to use as evidence of misconduct. People used to be able to screenshot this disappearing content but a recently added WhatsApp feature now blocks this, citing protection of privacy.

FAKE NEWS

WhatsApp's connectivity and ease of use allows news to be shared rapidly – whether it's true or not. To combat the spread of misinformation, messages forwarded more than five times on the app now display a "Forwarded many times" label and a double arrow icon. This makes users aware that the message they've just received is far from an original ... and might not be entirely factual, either.

VISIBLE LOCATION

WhatsApp's 'live location' feature lets users share their current whereabouts, which can be helpful for including the state of the stat

EMPHASISE CAUTION

Encourage children to treat unexpected messages with caution: get them to consider whether it sounds like something a friend or relative would really send them. Make sure they know never to share personal details over WhatsApp, and to be wary of clicking on any links in messages. Setting up two-step verification adds a further layer of protection to their WhatsApp account.

ADJUST THE SETTINGS

It's wise to change a child's WhatsApp settings to specify which of their contacts can add them to group chats without needing approval. You can give permission to 'My Contacts' or 'My Contacts Except ...' Additionally, if a child needs to use 'live location', emphasise that they should enable this function for only as long as they need –

Advice for Parents & Educators

DISCUSS GROUP CHATS

Make children aware that there could be members of a group that they don't know well and that words can be misinterpreted. Encourage them to leave a good impression, to avoid joining in if conversations turn towards bullying, and to respond to such situations in an appropriate way. Make sure they know that it's Ok to leave a group chat if it makes them uncomfortable – or for any

THINK BEFORE SHARING

Help children understand why it's important to stop and think before posting or forwarding something on WhatsApp. It's easy – and all too common – for content that a user posts to be shared more widely, even publicly on social media. Encourage children to consider how an impulsive message or forwarding might damage their reputation or upset a friend who sent something to them in confidence.

CHAT ABOUT PRIVACY

Check in with the child about how they're using WhatsApp, making sure they know you only have their safety at heart. If you spot a 'Locked Chats' folder, you might want to talk about the sort of content they've stored in there, who they're talking to, and why they want to keep these chats hidden. Also, if children send any 'view once' content. It could be helpful to ask them why.


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
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
