Questions 1, 4 and 7 (Application)

Developing Change the meaning of a word using a prefix or suffix. Using words mainly taken from the Year 3/4 spelling lists.

Expected Explain how the addition of a prefix changes the meaning of a word. Using words mainly taken from the Year 5/6 spelling lists.

Greater Depth Change the meaning of a word using a prefix. Using words taken from the Year 5 and 6 spelling lists and more unfamiliar vocabulary.

Questions 2, 5 and 8 (Reasoning)

Developing Explain whether a statement about prefixes or suffixes is correct. The most common suffixes and prefixes are used throughout.

Expected Explain whether a statement about prefixes or suffixes is correct. A wider range of suffixes and prefixes are used.

Greater Depth Explain whether a statement about prefixes or suffixes is correct. Root words, prefixes or suffixes included may be archaic or unfamiliar.

Questions 3, 6 and 9 (Reasoning)

Developing Explain how different prefixes or suffixes change the meaning of a given root word. The most common suffixes and prefixes are used throughout.

Expected Explain how different prefixes or suffixes change the meaning of a given root word. A wider range of suffixes and prefixes are used.

Greater Depth Explain how different prefixes or suffixes change the meaning of a given root word. Root words, prefixes or suffixes included may be archaic or unfamiliar.

Application and Reasoning Consolidating Prefixes and Suffixes

Developing

- 1a. Unfinished – the sentence now means that Edgar did not complete his homework.
- 2a. Various answers, for example: uncovered; Henri uncovered another clue to help his case.
- 3a. False, supermodel means a person who is very famous for modelling whereas remodel means to change the form or shape of something.

Expected

- 4a. Disobeyed – the sentence now means that Joshua did not follow his mum's rules.
- 5a. Various answers, for example: unmotivated; Fletcher was completely unmotivated when it came to his homework, he simply didn't care.
- 6a. False, recharged means that lost charge has been restored to something where supercharge means extra charge has been added to something.

Greater Depth

- 7a. International – the sentence now means that he won a competition with competitors from different countries, not just his own.
- 8a. Various answers, for example: underestimate; Don't underestimate how strong an angry bear can be, especially when you have jam sandwiches in your bag!
- 9a. False, reactive means responding to something and overactive means excessively active.

Application and Reasoning Consolidating Prefixes and Suffixes

Developing

- 1b. Disagreed – the sentence now means that Bess did not agree with Tatum.
- 2b. Various answers, for example: reacted; Yasmeena's mum reacted very badly when she noticed the antique vase had been broken.
- 3b. False, while the prefixes 'mis' and 'dis' have a similar meaning, 'dislike' is a correct word whereas 'mislike' is not.

Expected

- 4b. Misheard – the sentence now means that Maria didn't hear or didn't understand what she was hearing when her sister was shouting for help.
- 5b. Various answers, for example: Reactivate – I ran towards the red button, leaping over the broken floorboards in an attempt to reactivate the ship's controls.
- 6b. True, mistrust and distrust are both valid words that are synonyms of one another.

Greater Depth

- 7b. Extraordinary – the sentence now means that doctor was successful even though he only had a low chance of success.
- 8b. Various answers, for example: distasteful; The boy made a rather distasteful joke in the playground that upset some of the other children.
- 9b. False, capitalise means to write letters in capitals and capitalism means a system in which a country's trade and industry are controlled by private owners for profit.
